

Cemetery History

The Kennesaw City Cemetery lies on the property of Camp McDonald, a former Confederate training ground for Georgia volunteers during the Civil War. The exact date that the cemetery was established is unclear, but the earliest known burial was in 1863.

It is thought that the Shumway family donated a tract of land for burual purposes prior to 1891 but record of this transaction hasn't been found. The cemetery on this land however, was evidently filling up by the turn of the century because the city purchased an additional 4 ½ acres in December 1900. An another ½ acre tract was acquired in 1903.

L.C. Chalker purchased a 1 ½ acre tract of land next to the cemetery from Dr. J.W. Ellis in 1934 and he purchased another acre in 1948. Both were to be used for burials. The Chalker family deeded these portions of land to the city in the mid-1950's.
